The local institutions run classes for their local community and then we run the network and provide the framework to ensure the Saturday Club runs smoothly for everybody

The idea of local ecology is really important

- Bringing together universities and the colleges with local partners and industry partners and businesses
- When the young people are engaging in the programme, they are given a sense of opportunities that are open to them within both future education and future career paths

6 different subjects that young people can explore

- Art and Design; Writing and Talking;
 Science and Engineering; Fashion and
 Business; Film and Media
- Also launching a new programme in
 International Relations with Chatham
 House
- The idea is for these programmes to be very hands on and practical experience
- No exams, not a formal curriculum
- Instead it is a free space for young people to come in and explore different places and ideas that they may have not been exposed to before

Very flexible about how the curriculum is developed as it is unique to each institution

 Very much about the kinds of spaces and facilities each place has to offer

- We can already see the transformational impact these clubs have on young people both emotionally and academically

<u>S. Solanki:</u> Sounds like a next step to a new direction in creative partnerships. The fact that you have these major institutions involved at such an early development of the club proves a great opportunity for

70% of young people who take part come under the 'widening participation' criteria

- Aware that these terms are not perfect in reaching everyone
- Reaches out to children who are on free school meals, disabled, from a low income or BAME background, or whose parents have not been to university

Noticed that a lot of young people joining the Saturday Club are not engaging that well at school or falling out of the formal curriculum and struggling to find where their skills lie

- The challenge is that many curriculums are based on testing and exam structure
- Want to build a more social and emotional relationship with these subjects and focus on creative skills that support you long term

Through the programme these young people grow in confidence and their well-being improves

 They grow socially and make friends from different communities who share similar interests

As a charity we support the host institutes with a national programme which includes a London visit where the young people can visit some of the major institutions and cultural opportunities in the capital engagement with a much wider group of people.

Loads of local artists are always complaining that there is no access for them to be involved in such opportunities. To get them to run workshops at the Saturday Club would be a winner for everyone.

L. Kennedy: With the masterclass programme we have worked with artists and practitioners individually running masterclasses for young people as well as businesses. A lot of the clubs are run by local practitioners. It is about knitting together all of the different elements of the community and supporting artists to actually engage with youth people.

In conversation now with a few artist studios about having a club that is run by the studio and the young people can engage with the artists and understand what that career path looks like.

- There is often a misconception, especially from parents, about opportunities within the arts community. There is often a feat there is a lack of security in it.

Instead, we are trying to show them the breadth of career opportunities within the creative sector is vast and there is plenty of opportunity.

Also trying to encourage the parents to understand that what these young people need for the future are creative skills.
